## **ART 7.3.6.2 Train Foreign Security Forces**

U.S. forces assist foreign security forces (FSF) by developing programs and institutions to train and educate FSF. These efforts must fit the nature and requirements of their security environment. The imperatives of U.S. forces for facilitating a comprehensive approach and engaging the threat discriminately apply to the train task. Training incorporates the individual and collective skills performed in conventional military operations.
