TASK STEPS

1. The staff coordinates the initial response to establish border control and boundary security in the area of operations by:
 - a. Establishing border control and boundary security measures to include:
 - (1) Guard posts.
 - (2) Ground and aerial patrols.
 - (3) Checkpoints.
 - (4) Instructions regarding permissible cross-border traffic.
 - (5) Requirements for identity cards or passes.
 - (6) Prior crossing coordination.
 - (7) Rules of engagement or rules on the use of force.
 - b. Implementing military police border control operations to include:
 - (1) Integration of border control and customs efforts.
 - (2) Enforcement of regulations and restrictions on personnel, vehicles, and material movement.
 - (3) Establishment of cooperative efforts with adjacent border agencies.
 - (4) Detection and apprehension of individuals or forces that threaten the security of the host nation.
 - c. Establishing rules of movement by implementing systems of:
 - (1) Identity cards.
 - (2) Travel passes.
 - (3) Ports of entry (POE).
 - (4) Controlled convoys.
 - (5) Curfews.
 - (6) Movement time windows.
 - (7) Off-limits areas.
 - d. Dismantling unauthorized roadblocks.
 - e. Establishing checkpoints and traffic control points.
 - f. Ensuring freedom of movement.

Environment: Environmental protection is not just the law but the right thing to do. It is a continual process and starts with deliberate planning. Always be alert to ways to protect our environment during training and missions. In doing so, you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects. Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT. .

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
