Condition: The command receives a mission order from higher headquarters and the commander issues guidance on planning disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration of former combatants. The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP 4.

Standard: The staff develops a plan for disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration of ex-combatants as part of stability peace enforcement measures through increased security of the post-conflict environment by ensuring the disbandment of armed groups and/or violent extremist organizations in accordance with the commanders intent, the rule of law, and unit standard operating procedures.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff plans the development of a secure environment by confirming that military forces conduct the following disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration (DDR) missions:

a. Develop disarmament and demobilization activities during initial response in which military forces:

- (1) Negotiate disarmament arrangements with belligerents.
- (2) Establish and enforce weapons control programs, including collection and destruction.
 - (a) Secure the support of community leaders, religious leaders or people of influence in the area of operations.
 - (b) Provide amnesty or protection for those who voluntarily surrender unauthorized weapons.
 - (c) Create a plan for the destruction of weapons or reallocation to security forces.
 - (d) Designate a storage area with a security plan for arms and ammunition.
 - (e) Secure funds necessary to implement, operate and enforce the program.
 - (f) Establish the window of compliance/amnesty and the consequences for noncompliance.
- (3) Provide reassurances and incentives for disarmed factions.
- (4) Establish a monitoring program.

b. Conduct demobilization processes.

- (1) Establish demobilization camps.
- (2) Confirm adequate health, food, and security for ex-combatants.
- (3) Coordinate discharge of active combatants from armed forces or other armed groups.

c. Conduct reintegration of ex-combatants in accordance with directives.

2. The staff coordinates the DDR of former combatants and belligerents.

a. Establish the disarmament process through:

- (1) Collection, documentation, control, and disposal of small arms, ammunition, explosives, and light and heavy weapons of former combatants, belligerents, and the local populace.
- (2) Development of a voluntary disarmament process responsible to which all parties accept.
- (3) The cultivation of high levels of trust between those being disarmed and the forces overseeing disarmament.
- (4) Closure of weapons and ammunition factories, and prevention of resupply.

b. Identify former combatants for processing and pre-discharge orientation.

- (1) Process of individual combatants in temporary centers.

(2) Mass troops in camps designated for demobilization purposes.

(3) Segregate adults, children, male and female.

(4) Confirm specific services for child Soldiers:

(a) Health care.

(b) Education.

(c) Food.

(d) Assistance with livelihood development.

(e) Reintegration into communities.

c. Plan for the dismantling of combatant chains of command.

d. Coordinate extensive counseling for former combatants, child soldiers, and belligerents traumatized by violent conflict prior to reintegrating into the local populace.

3. The staff coordinates the reintegration of ex-combatants.

a. Integrate former fighters and dislocated civilians into Host-Nation (HN) communities.

b. Develop programs to impart marketable skills to demobilized armed forces and groups, belligerents, and dislocated civilians.

c. Provide relocation assistance to support resettlement in civilian communities.

d. Provide basic and vocational education programs.

e. Provide employment assistance in local economies.

f. Develop amnesty and reconciliation programs in local communities.

4. The staff verifies the HN has the capacity to manage and assume responsibility of the DDR.

a. HN manages DDR effectively.

b. HN performs security mission with its legitimate military and police forces.

c. HN secures, stores, and disposes of weapons.

d. HN develops and maintains arms control capacity.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
