The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP 4.

Standard: The staff coordinates operations to restore order, halt violence, and to support, reinstate, or create civil authority by establishing a safe, secure, and stable environment for the local populace, supporting the overall stability operation in accordance with the commanders intent, orders from higher, local and international law, and unit standard operating procedures.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff coordinates conflict transformation by instructing rival factions in civil security through:
 - a. Negotiations.
 - b. Instruction on rule of law.
 - c. Protection of moderates.
2. The staff coordinates unity of effort and purpose by integrating activities with unified action partners to:
 - a. Divide labors.
 - b. Deconflict efforts.
3. The staff coordinates legitimacy and host nation ownership with host nation security forces so:
 - a. Local populations do not perceive US forces as an occupying force.
 - b. Host-nation security forces stay involved to promote the legitimacy of unified action partners.
4. The staff coordinates with unified action partners to build partner capacities of the host nation.
5. The staff assist host nation security forces to set conditions for Rule of Law.
 - a. Coordinates an initial response in which military forces:
 - (1) Enforce cease-fires.
 - (2) Supervise disengagement of belligerent forces.
 - (3) Identify and moderate and/or neutralize potential adversaries or ideologies.
 - (4) Provide security for negotiations.
 - (5) Establish and control buffer zones, including demilitarized zones.
 - b. Coordinates reestablishment of routine police functions.
 - (1) Assist in the cessation of large-scale violence.
 - (2) Establish public security.
 - (3) Establish physical protection.
 - (4) Establish territorial security.
 - (5) Reduce crime.
 - c. Restores public order.

- (1) Enforce law equitably.
 - (2) Protect lives.
 - (3) Protect property.
 - (4) Arrest and detain criminals.
 - (5) Improve cleanliness and order of public places.
 - (6) Respond to revenge crimes and extra-judicial killings aimed at:
 - (a) Former government officials.
 - (b) Specific segments of the population.
- d. Dismantles violent extremist organizations (VEO).
- e. Facilitates host nation with developing security measures to existing government institutions and infrastructure.
- (1) Confirm the operations of institutions are within internationally accepted norms.
 - (2) Identify and report abuses of power and corruption through US and host nation channels.
- f. Confirms enforcement of curfews.
- g. Confirms access to humanitarian aid for refugee camps and endangered populations.
- h. Monitors incarceration processes and transfers of prisoners.
6. The staff, in coordination with the Staff Judge Advocate, assists with rule of law activities to include:
- a. Restoration, assistance, and enhancement of the operation of the civil and criminal court systems:
 - (1) Vet and train judges, prosecutors, defense counsel, legal advisors, and administrators.
 - (2) Restore and equip court and administrative facilities.
 - (3) Restore and reform the host nation civil and criminal legal system.
 - (a) Review and revise statutes, codes, decrees, and other laws to ensure compliance with international legal standards.
 - (b) Advise Commanders and staffs on transitional measures for the immediate administration of justice.
 - b. Provide for an effective corrections system that complies with international standards, to include:
 - (1) Selecting, vetting, and training corrections officials.
 - (2) Constructing or renovating appropriate facilities.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
