**Conditions:** The IO Command is alerted to an IO Support Team deployment ISO of a unit conducting or preparing to conduct unified land operations in an operational environment that is dynamic and complex, against a hybrid threat. The deployment order and the installation, community, and unit standing operating procedures are available. Specifics regarding the support to be provided are known and captured in the deployment order to include: deployment location, the supported commanders intent, mission timeline, duration of the support mission, and the specialized, tailored effort requested. Contact through operationally secure means with the supported unit is available and underway. Secure facilities and resources are available at the deployment location. The IO Command headquarters staff is fully engaged in staff coordination activities to facilitate planning, preparing, and deploying an IO Support Team. Personnel required to conduct the mission are fully trained and available. Evaluations of other METT-TC factors do not negatively affect the decision to support the deployment request.
