1. The staff analyzes the mission order to identify liaison requirements.
2. The staff calculates liaison requirements by:
 - a. Identifying unified action partners in the area of operations.
 - b. Reviewing current friendly, enemy, adversary, and neutral situational information.
 - c. Reviewing US policy, goals, and mission objectives.
 - d. Determining operations security requirements for host-nation (HN) and unified action partners.
3. The staff facilitates liaison with HN and unified action partners by:
 - a. Sending and receiving liaison teams.
 - b. Establishing communication links to ensure continuous contact during operations.
 - c. Exchanging standard operating procedures.
 - d. Coordinating security operations.
 - e. Coordinating civil-military operations between HN and unified action partners.
 - f. Establishing procedural protocols between HN and unified action partners.
4. The staff recommends specific staff elements to provide liaison elements to HN and unified action partners.
5. The staff directs liaison elements to initiate contact with HN and unified action partners to:
 - a. Establish cooperation and understanding between forces and agencies.
 - b. Coordinate tactical matters to achieve unity of effort.
 - c. Integrate effects.
 - d. Facilitate coordination measures to achieve synchronized results.
6. The staff designates tasks, duties, responsibilities, and instructions to liaison officers by:
 - a. Identifying points of contact and decision makers.
 - b. Identifying near-term and anticipated future requirements.
 - c. Determining reporting processes.
 - d. Coordinating interpreter support.
 - e. Coordinating resources and facilities to support operations.

- f. Delivering resources to meet operational mission requirements.
- g. Sharing information and intelligence to increase situational awareness and understanding.
- h. Promoting US policy objectives before, during, and after operations.
- i. Developing measures of effectiveness.
- j. Developing measures of performance.
- k. Developing a transition plan.
- l. Identifying strategic, operational, and tactical objectives.
- m. Monitoring commander's critical information requirements.

7. The staff manages liaison efforts with HN and unified action partners by:

- a. Providing operational oversight and supervision.
- b. Facilitating information exchanges and sharing.
- c. Identifying, validating, or evaluating missions and projects.
- d. Connecting resources to missions and projects.

8. Liaison officers coordinate the transfer of information by:

- a. Facilitating communication between the command and receiving organizations and agencies.
- b. Providing timely information to and from the command.
- c. Facilitating understanding of the commander's intent to receiving organizations.

Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
