TASK STEPS

1. The staff plans initial activities to support the development of the judicial branch of the host-nation (HN) government:

a. Identifies HN legal professionals, including judges, prosecutors, defense counsel, legal advisors, legal administrators, and legal educators.

b. Identifies HN institutions that provide education and training:

(1) Law schools.

(2) Police academies.

(3) Bar associations.

(4) Civil society institutions.

(5) Libraries.

c. Identifies actual and potential HN leaders to integrate into HN judicial assistance and reform process.

d. Identifies any resentment or friction those leaders cause.

e. Identifies gaps and inconsistencies between the HN judicial system and international legal standards.

(1) Reviews the HN legal system and assists the HN participants in developing a judicial system that complies with international standards.

(2) Evaluates the legal training given to police and corrections officials to ensure compliance with international human rights standards.

f. Establishes vetting criteria that ensures compliance with international standards.

(1) Competence.

(2) Criminal behavior.

(3) Corruption.

(4) Abuse.

g. Trains HN criminal justice personnel.

(1) International human rights standards.

(2) Consequence for failure to respect human rights.

(3) Interim legal codes.

h. Trains HN judicial system personnel on modifications made to legal processes to ensure compliance with international legal standards.

i. Deploys judicial advisors and liaisons.

(1) Attorneys to train and assist HN and transitional courts.

(2) Specialists with experience in public safety, law enforcement, judicial administration, and corrections.

(3) Law enforcement personnel with investigative skills to train and assist HN police personnel.

2. The staff plans to rehabilitate or construct necessary facilities.

a. Identify key infrastructure facilities such as courts, police stations, public record facilities, and prisons.

b. Establish separate judicial system facilities for judges, defense counsel, trial counsel, and legal assistance personnel.

3. The staff confirms vetting of HN legal professionals.

a. Confirm vetting against database of credible reports of human rights violations.

b. Confirm vetting in accordance with Department of State and nationwide HN government policy.

4. The staff conducts liaison with legal officials of the HN to establish productive relationships and provide assurance of compliance with international legal requirements.

5. The staff plans transfer of the HN judicial system to an appropriate HN civilian agency:

a. Continue to monitor progress.

b. Continue to report progress.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
