Condition: The battalion is conducting combat operations and is receiving combat and operational stress casualties. Communications are established with adjacent units and higher headquarters. The chaplain assistant is available. There is access to other qualified individuals to perform ministry that the chaplain cannot personally perform due to religious beliefs or constraints to conscience. The chaplain assistant has been provided guidance on the rules of engagement (ROE) and/or rules for the use of force(RUF). Noncombatants (such as refugees, media, NGOs and/or contractor personnel) may be present in the operational area. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP 4.

Standard: Provide religious support to combat and operational stress casualties during all phases of operations.

Notes: 1. Identify the symptoms associated with combat and operational stress.
2. Determine appropriate, meaningful religious support requirements.
3. Provide religious support (free exercise of religion) for personnel experiencing combat and operational stress reactions.
4. Follow-up, document or refer as appropriate.
METHOD OF INSTRUCTION:Conference/lecture; Scenario; Video
METHOD OF TESTING:CRITERION TEST: From video/role play/scenario, student will identify beliefs that do things “for” the soldier and beliefs that do things “to” the soldier. Student will then determine most meaningful religious support for soldier.
REVIEW TEST:

Given a tactical environment, Soldiers experiencing combat and operational stress reactions, access to appropriate resources, materials and personnel necessary to provide religious support, qualified medical personnel and a chaplain assistant, perform religious support to combat and operational stress casualties IAW FM 1-05, Chapter 4, by identifying casualties, determining individual RS needs and providing combat and operational stress casualty ministry to include the specifics set forth in the task standards and performance measures.

Performance Steps

1. Identify Soldiers most in need of religious support.
 - a. Chaplain assistant can help in identifying Soldiers in need of religious support.
 - b. Proceed to area where Soldier(s) experiencing an adverse reaction to combat and operational stress is located.
2. Determine the religious support needs of the identified combat and operational stress reaction (COSR) casualties.
 - a. Establish priorities for ministry.
 - b. Consult medical personnel or combat and operational stress control (COSC) team, if available.
 - c. Determine denominational or religious preference of each Soldier.
3. Provide religious support (free exercise of religion) for COSR casualties.
 - a. Aid soldier in renewing physical, emotional and spiritual resources.
 - b. Solicit assistance from the chaplain assistant as required.
 - c. Focus ministry on reinforcing hope and a sense of personal worth of Soldier.
 - d. Provide assurance of God's presence and accessibility to Soldier even in combat.
 - (1) Presence
 - (2) Active listening
 - (3) Prayers
 - (4) Rites, sacraments or ordinances
 - (5) Reading from Scripture (Appropriate to their religious preference)
4. Encourage Soldier and continue to assess Soldier's needs, make referrals, and follow-up as necessary.
5. Provide religious support to caregivers.

(Asterisks indicates a leader performance step.)

Evaluation Guidance: Soldiers should be evaluated based on their ability to perform the tasks in accordance with the performance measures listed. Soldiers who miss any performance measure should be retrained and reevaluated.

Evaluation Preparation: Setup: Test this task using a video/role play/scenario. Brief Soldier: Tell the Soldier to talk through or role play the performance steps of providing religious support to the person who may be experiencing combat and operational stress reactions.

Always be alert to ways to protect our environment during training and missions. In doing so, you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects. Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT. Environmental protection is a continual process. Always be alert to ways to protect our environment and reduce waste.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. Everyone is responsible for safety. A thorough risk assessment must be completed prior to every mission or operation.
