Condition: Given operational command guidance in the form of approved joint and Army force level contracting support integration (CSIP) plans and orders, established standard operating procedures, and mission specific contracting policy/waivers, the CSB provided contracting support (less medical, major construction, and theater-level intelligence) for deployed Army forces. In field conditions, with a full set of authorized equipment and personnel along with functioning communications support, the CSB conducted mission command along with the following CSB specific tasks: develop theater contracting support plans; provide theater contracting support oversight; provide theater contracting support. TASK STEPS

1. Establish understanding of operational role and potential contracting needs to the supported unit.
 - a. Determine mission specific contract planning, management, and mission command structure requirements (i.e., CSB Headquarters and Contracting Support Battalion (CCBN) structure).
 - b. Specify the differences between contracting and command authority.
 - c. Provide a capabilities brief of assigned contracting officers and the limitations of the supported unit's authority.
 - d. Identify applicable thresholds, restrictions, and local policies which may impact the supported unit's decision making.
 - e. Develop contracting acquisition policies and supporting procedures.
 - f. Develop a site survey checklist. (Review characteristics of the tentative operations area as to land masses, water areas, climate, weather, and terrain to assess local procurement requirements.)
 - g. Determine contract law requirements and support arrangements.
 - h. Determine any liaison requirements to include State Department, United States Agency for International Development (USAID), and other non-governmental agencies.
 - i. Provide advice during the supported unit's Military Decision Making Process (MDMP) for operational and training missions.
 - j. Coordinate with ECC to determine any reach-back support arrangements.
2. Integrate theater support contracting plan into unit deployment and support plans.
 - a. Coordinate with the ECC to determine sourcing of CCBN, CCT, HQS augmentation and liaison requirement.
 - b. Identify supporting finance detachment or organization.
 - c. Identify contracting support priorities in terms of phases of the operation identified in the base order.
 - d. Identify LOGCAP services to transition to Theater Support Contracts.
 - e. Identify supported unit's equipment with contractor logistics support.
 - f. Identify support provided by LOGCAP and Army wide contracts or other service Civil Augmentation Program contracts.
 - g. Identify requirements consolidated at the Theater level and contracts available for use.
 - h. Prepare modification to existing support agreements.
 - i. Define the method of contracting for critical contingency contracting requirements (e.g., force protection measures, ice, water, housing units, tents, meals, translators, power generation, Non-Tactical Vehicles, etc.)

MOPP 4: Sometimes

MOPP 4 Statement: Commanders at all levels are responsible for integrating effective CBRN defense measures into their training and operations considerations. Commanders must recognize the significant increase in time required for mission execution in MOPP 4 and anticipate the effects of that degradation on subsequent missions. Leaders must also understand the increased drinking water requirements. The use of MOPP involves risk; the better commanders are at analyzing their units' needs for protection, the lower their units' risks. MOPP analysis enables leaders to select the appropriate MOPP level. During MOPP analysis, the commander considers factors such as mission, work rate and its duration, probable warning time, terrain, weather, time of day, unit training, additional protection available, and alarm placement.

Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
