**Condition:** The command receives a mission order from higher headquarters and the commander issues guidance on planning for the Personnel Recovery Coordination Cell and the Personnel Recovery Officers capability. The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP 4.

**Standard:** The staff, led by the Personnel Recovery section, plans and prepares the Personnel Recovery Coordination Cell and the Personnel Recovery Officers capability to execute personnel recovery missions in accordance with the commander's intent and standard operating procedures.

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**Cue:** None

## TASK STEPS

\* 1. The commander establishes a Personnel Recovery Coordination Cell (PRCC) and designates Personnel Recovery Officers to coordinate all component personnel recovery (PR) activities.

2. The staff, led by the PR cell, performs the following functions:

a. Develop the PR support plan.

b. Maintain situational awareness of isolated personnel reports (ISOPREP), evasion plans of action (EPAs), isolated personnel guidance (IPG), and Nonconventional assisted recovery (NAR) options.

c. Establish points of contact with unit managers, locations for EPAs, radio identification numbers and codes, PR alerting or communication equipment, and blue force tracker device numbers within commands.

d. Establish communications with the joint personnel recovery center (JPRC) and other PRCCs and develop or follow established SOP to ensure the timely flow and protection of PR-related information.

e. Establish PR reporting requirements for component units to include activation and de-activation notification to the adjacent PRCCs and the JPRC.

f. Verify that sufficient guidance, equipment, and personnel are available to ensure mission success.

g. Develop and promulgate component PR communications plans.

h. Coordinate for short-notice aircraft diplomatic authorization through command channels and with JPRC.

i. Develop a standardized notification process.

j. Coordinate with other component staff sections and elements, including unified action partners.

k. Notify the JPRC when isolated personnel event occurs.

l. Coordinate with the JPRC for PR support.

m. Coordinate with the component medical treatment facilities.

n. Conduct exercises to test the system.

3. The personnel recovery officer provides four capabilities to the unit:

a. Provides advice to the commander in response to an isolating event.

b. Provides a point of contact to answer inquiries about the doctrine and tactics for personnel recovery.

c. Establishes and maintains interpersonal links and exercises the communications systems to enable the staff personnel recovery experts to be ready.

d. Prepares training for the unit.

Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
