Standard MOPP 4 conditions do not exist for this task. See the MOPP 4 statement for specific conditions.

Standards: Erected tent within 15 minutes. Recovered the tent within 10 minutes. Did not damage the equipment. Did not sustain a cold weather injury. Met all critical performance measures IAW the Cold Weather Student Handout.
