TASK STEPS

1. The staff coordinates inputs into the area air defense plan (AADP).

2. The staff analyzes the AADP to identify combat identification criteria to process and assign tracks as friend, neutral, hostile, or unknown and determines the following:
 - a. Authorities delegated to air and missile defense (AMD) fire controllers in individual areas of operations.
 - b. Authorities delegated to execute identification of tracks in the joint data network.
 - c. Airspace element's capability to provide identification friend or foe, precise position location information, and visual identification.
 - d. Locations, number, and type of AMD sensors employed in the area of operations.
 - e. Completeness of the low-level air picture.

3. The staff determines if higher echelons retain combat identification authority or delegate this authority to lower echelons.
 - a. Determine, if delegated to lower echelons, whether the information is suitable for determining the identification of tracks in a unit's area of operation.
 - b. Determine whether to further delegate the responsibility of combat identification to subordinate units.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
