 - b. Determining points of origin of dislocated civilians.
 - c. Determining destinations of dislocated civilians.
 - d. Coordinating movement control measures.
 - e. Coordinating emergency medical care.
 - f. Providing life support needs.
2. The staff assesses transportation requirements for the movement of dislocated civilians by:
 - a. Determining the types of vehicles required.
 - b. Calculating the number of vehicles required.
 - c. Providing transportation assets.
3. The staff coordinates the move of dislocated civilians in a safe and humane manner.
4. The staff coordinates with host nation officials for the movement of dislocated civilians by:
 - a. Establishing temporary camps.
 - b. Providing a safe and secure environment.
 - c. Providing humanitarian relief.
5. The staff monitors movement of dislocated civilians by:
 - a. Identifying routes.
 - b. Determining control and assembly points.
 - c. Establishing emergency procedures.
 - d. Providing security.

Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT. .

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
