The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information. Standard: The staff plans emergency food relief programs through medical, logistics, transportation, and security activities to alleviate the immediate needs of a population in crisis in accordance with commanders guidance and standard operating procedure.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff develops an emergency food relief plan that includes:
 - a. Assessing population and unified action partners' capabilities.
 - b. Monitoring key aspects of indigenous food markets, to include:
 - (1) Security.
 - (2) Availability.
 - (3) Prices.
 - (4) Quality.
 - c. Determining the effects of conflict on food supplies due to:
 - (1) Destruction of crops and livestock.
 - (2) Disruption of distribution networks.
 - (3) Interruption of market activity.
 - (4) Security environment.
 - (5) Drought, flooding, or other natural disasters.
 - d. Estimating food requirements.
 - e. Assessing the adequacy of food distribution networks to include:
 - (1) Capacity of resources to distribute food from storage points to the affected populations.
 - (2) Assessment of food and water vulnerability.
 - (3) Food distribution routes and food storage facilities.
 - f. Providing emergency food as needed.
2. The staff plans the transfer of responsibility for emergency food relief programs to the host nation or other unified action partners.
3. The staff plans the termination of emergency food aid programs as developmental programs take effect and the host nation economy develops.
