Condition: The command receives a mission order from higher headquarters and the commander issues guidance on coordinating essential services for the host nation. The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP 4.

Standard: The staff coordinates for the restoration of host nation essential services (food, water, shelter, sanitation, and medical support) and protects host nation population until the host nation or civil relief agencies can provide security and services. The staff follows the commanders intent and standard operating procedures.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff coordinates efforts to provide initial response to support immediate humanitarian needs of the populace.
 - a. Designate whether to bring resources to the population or take the population to a centralized location.
 - b. Maintain security to ensure belligerents or violent extremist organizations (VEO) do not take supplies or that stronger civilians do not take from weaker ones.
 - c. Provide for immediate humanitarian needs.
 - (1) Food.
 - (2) Water (emergency).
 - (3) Shelter.
 - (4) Medical care.
 - d. Provide proper drinking water.
 - (1) Sanitation.
 - (2) Purification.
 - (3) Distribution.
 - e. Provide interim sanitation services.
 - (1) Removal of wastewater.
 - (2) Waste removal.
2. The staff facilitates transition from US support to host nation (HN) and/or civilian relief agencies responsibility for restoring essential services.
 - a. Develop HN capacity to operate and maintain essential services.
 - b. Establish civil services.
3. The staff coordinates operations to ensure sustainability of HN capacity to operate and maintain essential civil services.
 - a. Coordinate transition of responsibility to HN.
 - b. Identify modernization needs and the means to achieve them.
 - c. Monitor and report progress.

Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. .
