Condition: You are a Brigade or Task Force chaplain and your unit is scheduled to deploy in support of a Joint, Interagency, Intergovernmental and Multinational Operation where your brigade will be assigned to a Marine Corps Division. Given an OPORD, access to JP 3-0 Joint Operations, JP 1-05 Religious Affairs in Joint Operations, FM 1-05 Religious Support and available UMTs. This task should not be trained in MOPP 4.

Standard: Demonstrate understanding of the nature of religious support of Joint, Interagency, Intergovernmental, and Multinational operations by correctly identifying all joint terms and concepts found in JP 1-05, thoroughly review an OPORD for a Joint, Interagency, Intergovernmental, and Multinational mission and write a brigade level Religious Support (RS) plan that demonstrates 100 % knowledge of RS requirements of the mission. Afterwards, brief the unit commander (role player) on the RS plan.

Performance Steps

1. Conduct a thorough review of JP 1-05 Religious Affairs in Joint Operations and FM 1-05 Religious Support.
2. Identify joint force terms and concepts.
 - a. Defense Support of Civil Authorities (DSCA)
 - b. Interorganization coordination
 - c. Intergovernmental organization (IGO)
 - d. Nongovernmental organization (NGO)
 - e. Religious Affairs (RA)
 - f. Military engagement
 - g. Joint force chaplain (JFCH)
 - h. Religious Support Team (RST)
 - i. Joint Task Force (JTF)
 - j. Enlisted Religious Support Personnel terms
 - k. Religious Advisement
 - l. Religious Support
3. Identify the different chains of command/influence in a joint environment.
 - a. Joint Task Force (JTF) chain of command/influence (JTF, to COCOM, to JS)
 - b. Army chain of command (BCT-DIV-CORPS-ASCC)
 - c. Understand that the Army Brigade isn't joint, but simply an Army element in the Joint Operation.
4. Identify UMT requirements for Joint, Interagency, Intergovernmental and Multinational (JIIM) operations.
 - a. Establish early contact with JIIM partners to establish dialogue (RFIs), cooperation, and senior chaplain guidance.
 - b. Maintain JIIM partner dialogue and cooperation throughout the operation.
 - c. Advise the commander on religious matters affecting the operational area.
 - d. Advise subordinate Unit Ministry Teams.
 - e. Establish relationships with local religious leaders when directed by the command.
 - f. Participate in humanitarian and civic assistance missions as directed by the command.

g. Build relationships and collaboration with other government agencies, NGOs, and intergovernmental organizations (IGOs) in support of command directives.

5. Identify requirements for RS planning for a Brigade Level JIIM mission:

- a. Participate in the staff planning process.
- b. Review the Operations Order for RS requirements.
- c. Determine area coverage to address RS gaps effecting personnel both internal and external to your organization.
- d. Prepare religious affairs attachments to operations, plans, orders, and directives.

e. Coordinate the provision of religious support with higher, adjacent, and subordinate chaplains in a spirit of teamwork, communication and respect.

- f. Identify, requisition, and maintain necessary assets and resources.
- g. Plan RS for widest faith group representation as possible in the BCT area of operations.
- h. Ensure Distinguish Faith Group Leaders are vetted, trained, and supervised.
- i. Ensure UMTs avoid the appearance of favoring a particular faith group over another

6. Identify the components of a religious estimate in a JIIM environment.

a. How do US political goals for this situation interface with the religious sensibilities of the host nation concerned and the local communities in the operational area?

b. How might religious leader engagement facilitate the commander's intent, endstate, and operation?

c. What religious practices (or religions) directly affect the host nation decision making process?

d. How does religion affect the principles of law and justice?

e. How does religion affect the use of force, civilian and military?

f. How does religion affect the economic prosperity, distribution of income, and religiously factored concepts of economic justice?

g. How does religion affect reconciliation, treaties, an a sustainable peace?

h. How does religion affect social structures: class, caste, tribe, region, and occupation?

i. What is the relationship between religion and freedom of communication and access to media?

j. What is the relationship between state and religious schools, preference of certain schools, licensure of teachers and other religiously factored elements on education?

k. How does the state use or regulate mass media (television, radio, internet) to promote religious access and content?

l. What religious entities or organizations are formally and informally recognized by hte state?

- m. What is the role of religious leadership and extent of their influence?
 - n. What is the role of the US military with faith based organizations (e.g. missionary, church, religious NGOs)?
 - o. What considerations are important in the interagency and joint force environments with regard to religious factors?
 - p. What is the impact of US and global media coverage of religious issues in the host nation and region?
 - q. What are the ongoing religiously conflicts in the host nation and what is the level of repression of minority groups?
 - r. What is the impact of a US/multinational presence on the religious life of the area (e.g. incite violence, supports religious freedoms)?
 - s. What skill sets do multinational forces chaplains bring to support religious liaison with host nation?
7. Conduct routine analysis of Religious Support operations in the brigade to ensure continued effectiveness.

(Asterisks indicates a leader performance step.)

Evaluation Guidance: Score the Soldier GO on performance measures passed. Score the Soldier NO GO on any performance measure failed. The Soldier must score a GO on 100% of the performance measures listed to receive a GO on the task. If the Soldier scores a NO GO, show the Soldier what was wrong and retest.

Evaluation Preparation: To evaluate this task, prepare a scenario (role play) that requires the brigade level chaplain to correctly identify all seven performance steps for providing religious support in a joint, interagency, intergovernmental, multinational operation from a the brigade level perspective. The student must demonstrate knowledge with both a religious support (RS) attachment (Tab D) and by conducting a briefing (role play) to the unit commander.
