### Performance Steps

1. Place RFID tags on transfer cases at the MACP or TMEP.

a. Enter all pertinent information into the system at the MA facility.

b. Attach the RFID tag to the transfer case by placing two strips of industrial type double-sided tape on the base of the tag.

c. Attach the base of the RFID tag to the head end of the transfer case, preferably directly underneath the carrying handle. Note: This location is preferred to disguise the tag from appearing too bulky underneath the draped flag and so as not to interfere with the placement of the transportation documents.

d. Slide the RFID tag onto the base and ensure it “clicks” in securely.

2. Place RFID tags on Tri-Walls at the MACP or TMEP.

a. Note: Tri-Walls are being used to ship personal effects to the JPED at Dover AFB. Once the units deliver their pre-inventoried boxes to the MACP or TMEP they are placed inside the Tri-Wall and banded for security.

b. Attach the RFID tag to the inside of the Tri-Wall by placing two strips of industrial type double-sided tape on the base of the tag.

c. Place the tag base on the interior of the plastic lid to avoid stripping the cardboard interior of the Tri-Wall. Thread wire through the two holes in the tag and wire it to the band.

d. Secure the tag to the band with a car seal. Note: Once the Tri-Walls arrive at the JPED in CONUS depot personnel will inactivate the RFID tags.

Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT. "Environmental protection is not just the law but the right thing to do. It is a continual process and starts with deliberate planning.

Always be alert to ways to protect our environment during training and missions. In doing so you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects."

**Safety:** In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with FM 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete a DA Form 7566 COMPOSITE RISK MANAGEMENT WORKSHEET during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. Everyone is responsible for safety. A thorough risk assessment must be completed prior to every mission or operation.

Strict adherence to sanitary measures while processing remains and personal effects. Rubber gloves will be used when handling remains. All personnel handling remains and personal effects will wash their hands with soap and water. Litters and other equipment will be thoroughly scrubbed. These precautions are required to prevent the spread of disease and contamination. When handling remains personal hygiene and safety must be maintained as they pertain to the practices of personal environmental disinfection and decontamination by practitioners of mortuary services. The wearing of protective clothing, as required by the Armed Force Public Health Guidelines, such as surgical gowns, gloves, masks (cotton and/or OSHA type oral nasal, goggles and/or glasses) will be minimize transmission of infectious agents associated with the medical and paramedical environments. Mortuary affairs personnel should also receive an annual physical examination and adhere to an effective program of routine prophylactic immunizations.
