f. Ensure that all instructors are placed on additional duty orders.

g. Ensure all instructors and assistant instructors (AI) are trained on equipment, course material and requirements.

11. Notify students of their selection to attend the Combat Life Savers (CLS) course at least two weeks prior to the start of instruction.

Note: To limit training time missed, ensure that students know to NOT schedule appointments during the course. The course is their place of duty, until course completion.

13. Annotate students certifications will be completed and entered into Army Training Requirements and Resources System (ATTRS)by the instructing staff.
