Condition: The command is conducting operations as a Joint Task Force (JTF) or as a Combined Joint Task Force (CJTF) headquarters. The command's headquarters receives liaison, unit, and individual augmentees. The command receives an operations order from higher headquarters. The commander issues guidance on critical friendly and adversary information requirements. The command establishes communications with subordinate and adjacent units and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information in accordance with standard operating procedures. This task should not be trained in MOPP 4.

Standard: The staff determines critical information required to understand the operational environment and to support the decision making process in accordance with the commanders intent, orders from higher headquarters, and standard operating procedures.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff analyzes the mission and the commander's initial guidance to:
 - a. Determine specified, implied, and essential tasks.
 - b. Evaluate constraints placed on the command.
 - c. Establish the commander's intent and concept of operations.
 - d. Determine available assets and identify resource shortfalls.
 - e. Calculate the operational timeline.
 - f. Confirm the missions of adjacent, supporting, supported organizations, and unified action partners and their command relationships.
 - g. Orient the assigned area of operation.
 - h. Identify critical facts and develop assumptions.
 - i. Update staff estimates.
 - j. Develop initial themes and messages.
 - k. Produce a proposed mission statement.
 - l. Develop course of action evaluation criteria.
 - m. Perform the intelligence preparation of the battlefield to:
 - (1) Define the operational environment.
 - (2) Assess the effects of the environment on operations.
 - (3) Evaluate threat characteristics, doctrine, tactics, techniques, and behavior.
 - (4) Determine possible, likely, and most dangerous threat courses of action.
 - (5) Identify information collection assets' sensitivities to weather effects on operations.
 - (6) Select high-value targets.
 - n. Identify information gaps about the adversary and other relevant aspects of the operational environment.
2. The staff develops requirements for collection of information or the production of intelligence by:
 - a. Assessing the information gaps about the adversary and the operational environment.
 - b. Requesting nominations for intelligence requirements from the staff.
 - c. Consolidating intelligence requirement nominations from the staff.

- d. Recommending approval and the priority of requirements.
 - e. Developing friendly force information requirements to understand the status of friendly force capabilities.
 - f. Designating requirements for intelligence that are critical to understand the adversary and the operational environment as priority intelligence requirements.
 - g. Producing essential elements of friendly information that inform a priority intelligence requirement.
 - h. Developing indicators and specific information requirements for each priority intelligence requirement and friendly force information requirement to produce the collection plan.
3. The staff manages commander's critical information requirements by operational phases or to support specific decisions by:
- a. Updating priority intelligence requirements to address new requirements or concerns and as the situation changes.
 - b. Updating friendly force information requirements to address new requirements or concerns and as the situation changes.
 - c. Designating the latest time information is of value to meet operational requirements for each requirement.
 - d. Maintaining a balance between mission critical requirements and intelligence support capability.
 - e. Monitoring intelligence requirements of higher, adjacent, subordinate, and supported elements.
 - f. Tracking the operational requirements of supported elements.
 - g. Resolving conflicts for resources and eliminating redundancies in intelligence requirements.
 - h. Identifying collection capability shortfalls to generate requests for forces and requests for support from national intelligence resources.
 - i. Removing satisfied requirements.
 - j. Developing new requirements.
