Task Statements

Cue: You have been assigned in the Battalion S3 section as the Motor Transport operations section chief, given ATP 4-11 and a requirement to conduct motor transport operations under the supervision of the Operations officer or the Battalion XO.

DANGER
Soldiers must be aware of the inherent dangers of working in and around tactical wheeled vehicles. Hot vehicles, Hot surfaces, sharp, moving objects such as fan blades, slippery surfaces, and excessively loud noises are all dangers. These dangers are also applicable to hazardous cargo being transported (explosive hazard) (as applicable). Each Soldier should take every precaution not to become a victim of these dangers by following regulatory guidance and risk management rules. If armed the vehicle has additional ammunition, explosive and negligent discharge hazards.

11. Maintains contact and exchanges information with security and intelligence personnel of higher and adjacent units.
12. Makes security inspections.
13. Requests road clearance for convoys and movement of oversize loads.
14. Advises the commander on operational, security, and training matters.
15. Assesses subordinate units environmental risk assessments and advises the Battalion commander on their status and outcome.

Environment: Environmental protection is not just the law but the right thing to do. It is a continual process and starts with deliberate planning. Always be alert to ways to protect our environment during training and missions. In doing so, you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects. Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT. It is the responsibility of all Soldiers and DA civilians to protect the environment from damage. All soldiers are responsible for making every effort in minimizing or preventing damage to the environment during tactical operations. Any spillage of contaminants (fuel, oil, etc) must be contained until such time as a recovery team can perform necessary clean up operations.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with ATP 5-19, Risk Management. Leaders will complete the current Deliberate Risk Assessment Worksheet in accordance with the TRADOC Safety Officer during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Nuclear, Biological, and Chemical (NBC) Protection, FM 3-11.5, Multiservice Tactics, Techniques, and Procedures for Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear Decontamination. Safety is a MAJOR factor in ensuring all related operations are conducted properly and do not expose Soldiers to unnecessary hazards in the work environment. All Da Civilians, Soldiers, Noncommissioned officers and officers are REQUIRED to abide by all safety standards applicable and to report or correct deficiencies.
