Condition: The command has received an operations plan, warning, operations, or fragmentary order from higher headquarters and is exercising mission command. The commander has issued planning guidance to coordinate populace and resource control. The command has established communications with subordinate and adjacent units, and higher headquarters. The mission command system is operational and processing information in accordance with standard operating procedures. Some iterations of this task should be performed in MOPP.

Standard: The staff led by the Provost Marshal section coordinates with the host nation to affect populace and resource control measures in order to provide security for a populace, deny personnel and materials to the enemy, mobilize population and material resources, and detect and reduce the effectiveness of enemy agents.

Note: Task steps and performance measures may not apply to every unit or echelon. Prior to evaluation, coordination should be made between evaluator and the evaluated units' higher headquarters to determine the performance measures that may not be evaluated.

DANGER

Leaders have an inherent responsibility to conduct Risk Management to ensure the safety of all Soldiers and promote mission accomplishment.

Risk Management is the Army's primary decision-making process to identify hazards, reduce risk, and prevent both accidental and tactical loss. All soldiers have the responsibility to learn and understand the risks associated with this task.

Identifying hazards and controlling risks across the full spectrum of Army functions, operations, and activities is the responsibility of all Soldiers.

TASK STEPS

1. The staff led by the Provost Marshal (PMO) section in coordination with the host nation (HN) applies populace and resource control measures to mitigate:

- a. Uncontrolled and uncoordinated movement of frightened civilians about the environment.
- b. Uncontrolled and uncoordinated movement of civilians conducting legitimate activities.
- c. Illegal or illegitimate activities, such as insurgent operations or black market activities.
- d. The denial of personnel and materials to the adversary.
- e. The provision of security for local populace.
- f. The effectiveness of insurgents and enemy agents:
 - (1) Conduct mounted patrols.
 - (2) Conduct dismounted patrols.
 - (3) Coordinate air patrols.

2. The staff coordinates with HN civil authorities to identify and implement populace and resource control measures:

- a. Populace control:
 - (1) Establishes and maintains curfews.
 - (2) Restricts movement throughout the area of operations.
 - (3) Inspects travel permits and registration cards.
 - (4) Resettlement of dislocated civilians.
- b. Resource control:
 - (1) Rations control of food, fuel, and water.
 - (2) Secures humanitarian-assistance distribution centers.
 - (3) Conducts licensing operations.
 - (a) Business license.
 - (b) Building permits.
 - (c) Vehicle license and registration.
 - (4) Initializes regulations or guidelines.
 - (a) Immigration regulations.

(b) Customs regulations.

(c) Agriculture regulations.

(5) Establishes checkpoints or roadblocks.

(6) Employs amnesty programs.

(7) Conducts inspections of critical infrastructure.

Note: Note: The training of Host Nation police requires DA approval, and restrictions exist on some forms of training. Legal advice and coordination are mandatory before training can occur. Civilian agencies typically provide training and capacity-building for law enforcement services; however, in a failed state when it is not safe for a civilian team of trainers, military police may be directed to assist in training and advising the local police and correction officers.

3. When authorized, the staff, in coordination with the provost marshal section, supports and coordinates the development of a HN police training program through the international military education and training program in the following areas:

a. Protection of critical personnel and facilities.

b. Support of refugees or dislocated civilians.

c. Establishment and maintenance of HN law and order.

Environment: Environmental protection is not just the law but the right thing to do. It is a continual process and starts with deliberate planning. Always be alert to ways to protect our environment during training and missions. In doing so, you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects. Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT.

Safety: In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with FM 5-19, Composite Risk Management. Leaders will complete a DA Form 7566 COMPOSITE RISK MANAGEMENT WORKSHEET during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, NBC Protection, FM 3-11.5, CBRN Decontamination. .
