    - (4) Domestic law.
2. The International Law division Implements the Department of Defense Law of War (LOW) program, including:
  - a. LOW training.
    - (1) Advice concerning the application of LOW to military operations.
    - (2) Determination of enemy prisoner of war status.
    - (3) Supervision of war crime investigations and trials.
  - b. Advice concerning the application of LOW to military operations.
  - c. Assistance with development of international agreements concerning legal liaison with host or allied nation legal authorities.
  - d. Determination of enemy prisoner of war status.
  - e. Supervision of war crime investigations and trials.
3. The International Law division coordinates international law assistance:
  - a. Development of international agreements concerning legal liaison with host or allied nation legal authorities.
  - b. International legal issues relating to U.S. forces overseas including:
    - (1) Legal basis for conducting operations.
    - (2) Status of forces agreements.
    - (3) Impact of foreign law on Army activities and personnel.
  - c. International legal issues in intelligence including:
    - (1) Security assistance.

In doing so, you will contribute to the sustainment of our training resources while protecting people and the environment from harmful effects. Refer to FM 3-34.5 Environmental Considerations and GTA 05-08-002 ENVIRONMENTAL-RELATED RISK ASSESSMENT

**Safety:** In a training environment, leaders must perform a risk assessment in accordance with FM 5-19, Composite Risk Management. Leaders will complete a DA Form 7566 COMPOSITE RISK MANAGEMENT WORKSHEET during the planning and completion of each task and sub-task by assessing mission, enemy, terrain and weather, troops and support available-time available and civil considerations, (METT-TC). Note: During MOPP training, leaders must ensure personnel are monitored for potential heat injury. Local policies and procedures must be followed during times of increased heat category in order to avoid heat related injury. Consider the MOPP work/rest cycles and water replacement guidelines IAW FM 3-11.4, NBC Protection, FM 3-11.5, CBRN Decontamination. .
